About the Program

VAESP is a long-term partnership between Australia and Vanuatu to support Vanuatu's development priorities through equitable access to schooling, and improved education quality and management. VAESP works with Vanuatu's Ministry of Education and Training (MoET) to deliver the Vanuatu Education and Training Sector Strategy (VETSS) to improve learning outcomes, by strengthening community engagement, management processes, and teaching effectiveness.



VAESP End of Program Outcomes

More children (girls and boys, including those with disabilities) are enrolled and attend the right year of primary school at the right age

Students achieve improved literacy and numeracy outcomes (measured at Years 4, 6 and 8)

MoET has implemented devolution at provincial and school levels, strengthening reporting and data systems to inform planning, implementation and decision making to improve student learning outcomes

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Promote right age enrolment

Improve enrolment for primary school-aged children, including those with disability, with 91.1% now enrolled in primary schools



Scale-up nationally the success of 45 pilot schools using innovative inclusive education approaches



Improve gender balance in education. 65% of VAESP employees are women and 29% of education leaders trained were women
